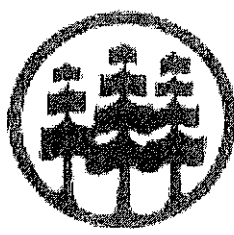

Community Fridges are spaces where anyone can access free, quality food that would otherwise go to waste, connect with others, learn about the environmental impact of food, and share knowledge and skills.

**Eligible Expenses:**

- Selected applicants must allocate funding in one or more of the categories listed below:
- artists fees, workshop fees, performance fees – funds can only be used to compensate Albertan artists
- event and workshop materials – for example: paint brushes, paper, costume rentals, etc.
- marketing and communications – for example: newspaper ads, graphic design fees, etc.
- volunteer expenses – for example: t-shirts (for identification purposes only), refreshments while working at the event, etc.
- food and beverage – note alcoholic beverages and bar services are not eligible
- honorariums, wages and contract wages agreements with cultural workers and artists who are not already employed as staff by the applicant organization – for example: ushers, stage managers, technicians, etc.
- technology costs – for example: Zoom, WebEx, audio, and visual technician services
- equipment rental – for example: lighting, sound
- venue rental – for example: any identified programming space
- equipment rental – for example: lighting, sound etc.

**Letters of Municipal Opinion**

If applying for CFEP (or any other grant) which requires a Letter of Municipal Opinion, please send the request to your NPC as early as possible to gain the appropriate signatures. A minimum of two weeks would be preferential.

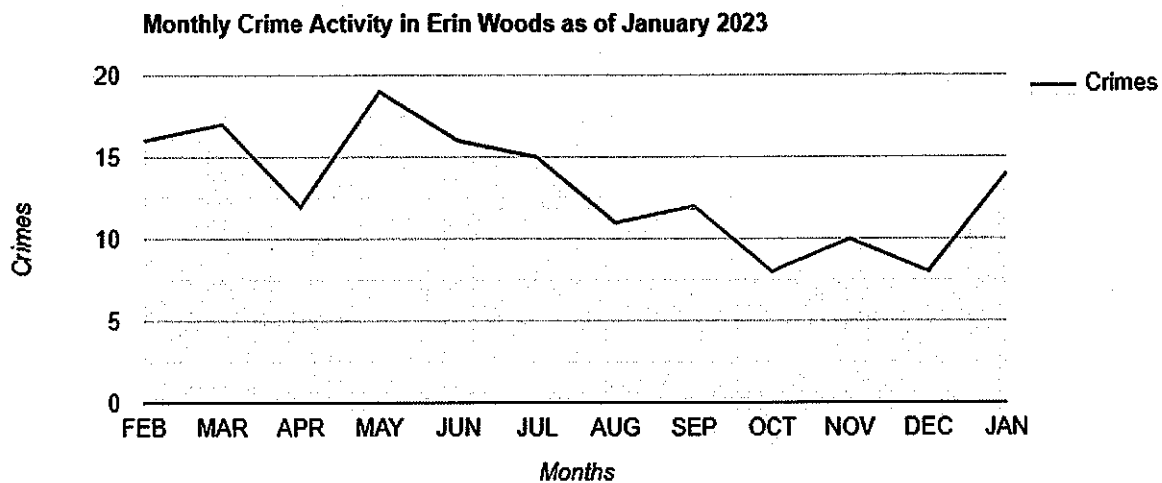

- When the City reboots the SLOWS program, I'll order another machine.

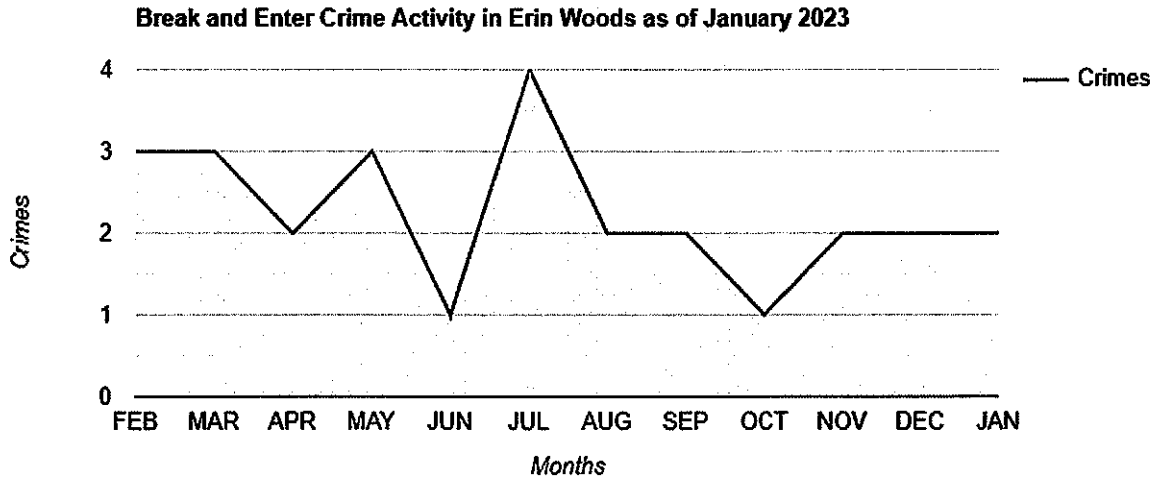
## Erin Woods Crime Activity was Up in January 2023

Erin Woods Calgary experienced 14 crimes in January 2023, in comparison to 8 crimes the previous month, and 14 crimes in January one year ago. The Erin Woods community has an average of 13.2 crimes per month. On an annual basis, Erin Woods had a total of 158 crimes as of January 2023, which is up 5% in comparison to 151 crimes as of January 2022. Total Erin Woods community crimes is calculated as the sum of break & enters (dwelling, commercial, and other premises), theft from vehicles, theft of vehicles, assaults (nondomestic), commercial robberies, street robberies, and non-domestic 'other' violence.

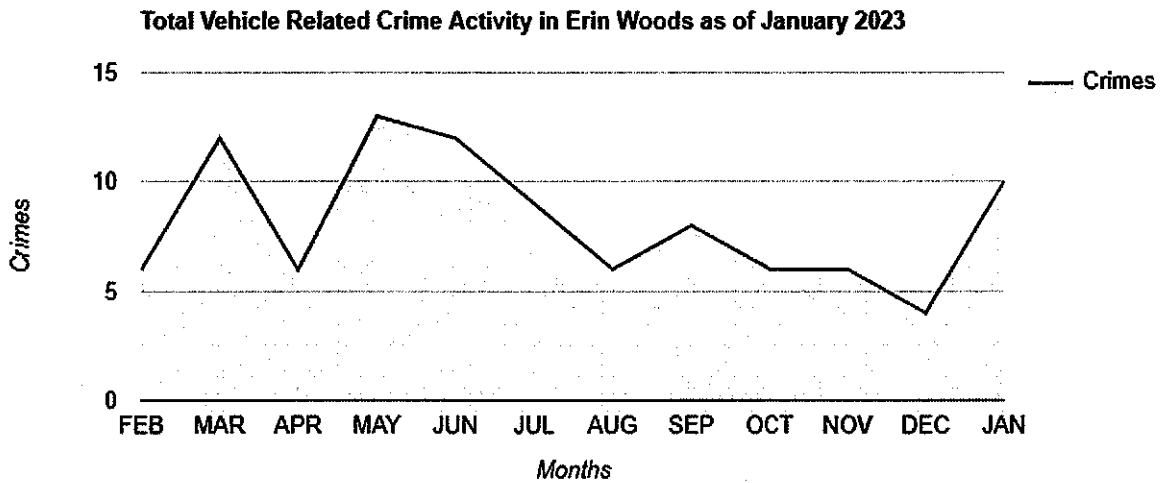


Erin Woods Calgary had 2 break and enter (B&E) crimes in January, in comparison to 2 B&E crimes in December and 4 B&E crimes in January 2022. On an annual basis, Erin Woods had a total of 27 B&E crimes as of January 2023, which is down from 28 B&E crimes as of January 2022.

Erin Woods had 10 vehicle related crimes (theft of or theft from vehicles) in January 2023, in comparison to 4 vehicle related crimes in the previous month, and 6 vehicle related crimes in January 2022. On an annual basis, Erin Woods had a total of 98 vehicle related crimes as of January 2023, which is up in comparison to 83 vehicle related crimes as of January 2022.



Physical and social disorders are excluded from this article because a very low proportion of disorder-based calls for service result in crime reports. Physical and social disorders are often highly visible, occurring in public spaces; examples include public intoxication, panhandling, youth gangs, prostitution, littering, loitering and graffiti.
